ABOUT THE TRUNK SCHOLARSHIPS

When students begin their college journey prepared, confident, and focused on their goal of obtaining a post-secondary education, their chances for success increase exponentially. With the help of sponsors, we make that possible.

Through its Revie Sorey Trunk Scholarships, Ada S. McKinley awards first-year college students with the living and learning essentials they need to adjust and achieve success in their new environment. Each trunk is filled with school supplies and necessities for dorm living, along with the technology tools necessary to take full advantage of all education formats and platforms available for learning (laptops, etc).

The scholarships are named in honor of Revie Sorey, Ada S. McKinley's former Educational Services Director and former professional American football player (Chicago Bears, 1975-1983). Revie trailblazed the program fifteen years ago in 2008 after learning our college-bound students were burdened by the expenses of dorm room & school supplies not covered by grants & scholarships.

The Trunk Scholarships are an important extension of Ada S. McKinley's acclaimed College Preparation & Placement Program, pioneered by the late Silas Purnell. The program has placed more than 75,000 youth in more than 400 colleges and universities throughout the United States. This includes assisting graduating seniors in securing billions of dollars in financial aid and scholarships over the last six decades.

Jewell worked as an Anchor/Reporter for 16 WAPT, during her last several years in Mississippi. Jewell started her journalism career at WTVO in Rockford, IL, as a general assignment and consumer reporter.

During an internship at a local station, Jewell learned what it would take to succeed as a broadcast journalist from WGN's Ben Bradley, whom she continues to learn from today. Jewell went on to earn her M.A. degree in Public Affairs Reporting from the University of Illinois at Springfield.

Torrence Hinton became president of Peoples Gas and North Shore Gas in June 2022 where he manages the daily operations, strategy and administrative activities of the two Illinois WEC Energy Group utilities. He was formerly vice president of operations at Peoples Gas, and also served as director of operations and maintenance at Peoples Gas and North Shore Gas.

Torrence joined Peoples Gas in 1999. Before serving in the company's top leadership, he served in a number of roles with increasing responsibility, including manager of centralized planning group, director of fleet services, operations manager of North Shore Gas, operations manager of Peoples Gas, and general manager of North District at Peoples Gas. Prior to that, he served as director of gas storage, overseeing natural gas storage assets for WEC Energy Group in Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota.

Torrence holds a Bachelor of Science degree in mechanical engineering from the Illinois Institute of Technology, where he received the Clinton E. Stryker Distinguished Service Award for his leadership and contributions in the area of campus life. He also holds a Master of Science degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Illinois at Chicago and a Master in Business Administration with a concentration in strategy and leadership from the University of Chicago Booth School of Business.
